ARCHITECTURAL SIGNIFICANCE (describe important architectural features and evaluate in terms of other buildings within community)

This two story Georgian dwelling with pitched roof and symmetrical five bay facade is vernacular in style with little exterior architectural detail. Deed research by the present owner indicates that this house was moved onto this site in 1777. Originally the house was located on the corner of Merrill and Merrimac Streets. Noteworthy features of this house include chamfered beams, gunstock posts and an unusual cove cornice. The original doorway has been altered and the front entrance is presently Greek Revival in style.

HISTORICAL SIGNIFICANCE (explain the role owners played in local or state history and how the building relates to the development of the community)

Deed research by the present owner of this house indicates that this house was moved to this lot in 1777, by John Butler. Butler was a soldier who fought in both the Revolutionary War and the War of 1812. He also signed the petition to separate Newburyport from Newbury in 1763. Supposedly the house was cut down by four feet on each side so that the house would fit the new lot.

Later owners of the house included Benjamin Rogers, the founder of the Newburyport Marine Society and Gilman Frothingham, one of the founders of the Mechanicks National Bank in 1812. In 1823 Zebulon Titcomb, a shipbuilder, was the owner of this house.
