

ARCHITECTURAL SIGNIFICANCE (describe important architectural features and evaluate in terms of other buildings within community)

The Edward Bass House is a fine example of the Federal style which proliferated in Newburyport in the early years of the nineteenth century. The form of the house is quite typical, of three stories with hipped roof and decreasing window size in the upper stories. Also typical is the doorway with fanlight and sidelights flanking the door. The window caps are exceptional. The entrance porch is a twentieth century addition to the building.

HISTORICAL SIGNIFICANCE (explain the role owners played in local or state history and how the building relates to the development of the community)

This house was built for Edward Bass Jr. by an unknown builder. When Bass died the house passed to his son, also named Edward. In 1851 Bass is listed as a goldsmith with a shop at 80 Merrimac Street. In 1858 the house was inherited by a cousin, Thomas H. Whitney. The Whitney's owned the house well into this century. Consequently the house has been called the Bass-Whitney House.
