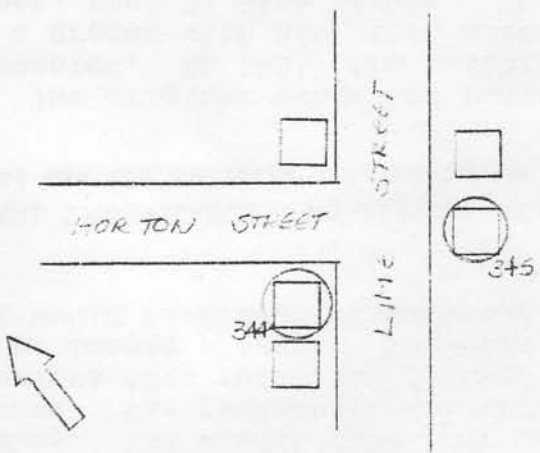

ARCHITECTURAL SIGNIFICANCE (describe important architectural features and evaluate in terms of other buildings within community)

The wide low gambrel roof on this two and a half story Georgian home is indicative of an early construction date. This house has had numerous alterations. Little original exterior architectural detail remains. The window sash have been replaced and the doorway has been altered. The pedimented entrance porch is probably original. The pilasters that typically flanked the door in this type of Georgian doorway are no longer present. The side walls have been shingled while originally they would have been clapboarded as is the facade.

HISTORICAL SIGNIFICANCE (explain the role owners played in local or state history and how the building relates to the development of the community)

The original owner and builder of this house has yet to be documented. In 1851, the building was owned by James Young. Young was a grocer with his store across the street on the site of 87 Lime Street, then 71 Lime Street. The house at 86 Lime Street was then 72 Lime.

These properties were owned by James Young and his heirs until about 1890.
