ARCHITECTURAL SIGNIFICANCE (describe important architectural features and evaluate in terms of other buildings within community)

This three story Federal house with hipped roof and symmetrical five bay facade has many features seen in Federal homes built in Newburyport. The form of the house is typically Federal as are the simple window lintels and cornice moulding. The front entrance of this house is quite interesting. It was altered during the Greek Revival period and is quite elaborate for that period. The door and the panels around it are elaborately carved. The door is also flanked by fluted Greek pilasters supporting a bold Greek entablature above.

HISTORICAL SIGNIFICANCE (explain the role owners played in local or state history and how the building relates to the development of the community)

This house was constructed in the early years of the nineteenth century. The earliest owner has yet to be documented. In 1851, the house was owned by George Towle. Towle was a house carpenter employed on Brown's Wharf. Towle's occupation might explain the elaborate nature of the front entrance of the house which was probably altered during this period.

In 1872 the house was owned by Mrs. George Towle. She was listed in the 1871 City Directory as a dressmaker and tailoress. The house at 26 Congress Street, built between 1851 and 1872, was also owned by Mrs. George Towle.

Members of the Towle family have been making silver in the City of Newburyport since 1857.
