ARCHITECTURAL SIGNIFICANCE (describe important architectural features and evaluate in terms of other buildings within community)

This multiple family residence is typical of those built throughout the City of Newburyport during the period of prosperty of the textile mills. The building exhibits all of the hallmarks of the vernacular Greek Revival style. These include the trabeated doorways flanked by sidelights and pilasters. The bold classically inspired cornerboards and cornice are also typical of the later Greek Revival period.

HISTORICAL SIGNIFICANCE (explain the role owners played in local or state history and how the building relates to the development of the community)

This building was built prior to 1851 when it was owned by Thomas Colby. Colby was a house carpenter with a business located at 21 Water Street. It is quite possible that Colby was the original owner and builder of the house. The building was undoubtedly built as speculation or as an investment property. In 1872 it was owned by James Blood. Blood, a real estate owner living on Merrimac Street, owned numerous properties in the North End. Most of these were rented to people working in the mills.
